Having a service component in our fellowship allows us to show newcomers that the miracle of this program can take them from feeling like a useless drunk to being a member in a fellowship that wants the best for each other while navigating this new spiritual life. We can find a real sense of purpose and direction within AA service and Area 50 has no shortage of opportunities.
